How the National Register Saved the day Across America!

Our Interstate System was one of the most exciting modern post WWII innovations. It was going to revolutionize travel in America and it did.

It kicked off under President Eisenhower in the 1950's. But at a price.

It was quickly apparent that connecting cities with these huge new highways and overpasses was going to be at the price of ripping through old neighborhoods . . . historic neighborhoods . .. and that it was going to cost us.

One elevated highway was planned right through the French Quarter along the river. We were losing landmarks right and left.

In 1966 Congress Passed The National Register of Historic Places

Any property of historic value and over 50 years old could not be damaged or have its enjoyment impaired by any project using Federal funds without the permission of the Chief Preservation Officer in each state. The head of the Mississippi Department of Archives and History is our CPO.

This simple act is powerful. It stopped the elevated highway in the Quarter and saved endless landmarks in America.

The Woodville National Register Historic District

As a Civic Club project the first phase of our Woodville National Register Historic District was an early one. It was completed with 147 sites listed in 1983.

Subsequently we added more and now we have a district of 242 sites. The county also has several dozen additionally independently nominated sites.

For a Town with about 950 residents that is a stunning amount and shows centuries long dedication to preservation in Woodville.

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The Wax Home . . a Fine and Only Example of the Eastlake Style

We have examples of all major periods of American architecture from the last 220 years but none as unique as our single example of EASTLAKE . . . a style that had a short period of popularity at the end of the Victorian period and the advent of the plain and simple Prairie Style and its similar Craftsman Styles.



The Wax House is a fine untouched and well preserved example on College Street. It's builder Koss Johnson and Architect J.T. Smith did a masterful job and it is now the home of a military man with extensive Wilkinson County family connections who has chosen to come "home" and retire. It was built in 1898.
